"Friend, Lend Me Your Hands." Fr. Rowel Jose (Arjay) Abanto

Let us reflect on our gospel this 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time wherein Jesus is giving instructions to the twelve as he sends them out on their mission. There are two things that Jesus gave His disciples. First, he first called them and then he sent them out two by two and gave them authority as they went forth. Thereby we are reminded that coming to Jesus precedes going out in His name. The rhythm of the Christian life is summarized in the two words: 'Come' and 'Go.' We come in prayer and contemplation to the Lord in order to go out in loving service. As Jesus sends the disciples on their mission, he warns them about what to expect, that they will not always be accepted by the people. They have to remember that the message is not to be forced on people. Faith is always an invitation to believe, not a command that has to be obeyed. What is especially noteworthy of the instructions that Jesus gave to his disciples before he sent them, is that he does not mention anything of what they were to say, rather, he stresses the kind of lives they should live. What Jesus is thereby driving home is the fact that the witness of their life will be the greatest sermon they will ever deliver. He does not want professionals who have honed their skills but people who live what they believe. The disciples must give witness to their own faith by what they do, and what they hold precious, thus by their example they will lead people to the kingdom of God. At times we tend to avoid our responsibility to live our prophetic calling saying that we are not good speakers, that we do not have leadership qualities, and that we don't have any experience.

Second, why does Jesus tell the apostles to "travel light" with little or no provision? Poverty of spirit frees us from greed and preoccupation with our possessions and makes ample room for God's provision. The Lord wants his disciples to be dependent on him and not on themselves. He wills to work in and through each of us for his glory. The Lord entrusts us with his gifts and talents. Are you eager to place yourself at his service, to do whatever he bids you, and to witness his truth and saving power to whomever he sends you? My brothers and sisters, God needs us as we are, and where we are now, not our capabilities, and our future plans!



The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus Parish (Sacred Heart Parish - 1910)



Original Church - 1910

The early years of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus Parish were marked by significant growth and development. In 1909, responding to the influx of residents in Calgary's west end, Bishop Legal tasked Father Jan with securing land for a new church. Shortly thereafter, sixteen lots were acquired, and a temporary two-story building was constructed. Officially named The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus Church, it opened for services in July 1910 with Father Nelz as the first resident pastor. The parish received formal recognition from Bishop Legal in June 1911.

Further developments included the formation of a Ladies' Altar Society in 1911 to maintain the church's aesthetics. Father Naessens replaced Father Nelz as pastor that same year. To improve living conditions for the clergy, a residence for a housekeeper was established shortly thereafter, ensuring meals were prepared for the priests. The church itself underwent improvements with the addition of heating and a dedicated choir platform. Notably, 1912 saw the opening of Sacred Heart School, staffed by the Ursulines de Jesus nuns. Plans for a permanent church building were also formulated during this period.

However, the path forward wasn't entirely smooth. Financial constraints led to the rejection of a proposed new rectory in 1913. Disagreements arose between the Bishop and the Oblates, ultimately resulting in the departure of the latter in 1915. Father Jan assumed a new position elsewhere, and Father Hetherington was appointed to lead the parish.
